


This visualization summarizes Journey North contributions to the 2023 Blitz.




### During the 2023 International Monarch Monitoring Blitz, 1,449 Journey North volunteers from Canada, United States and Mexico submitted 3,288 reports in the United States.



# Majority of reports were submitted by volunteers in the state/provinces of: IL, PA, ON, MI, OH, WI, MN, NY, and MA at the median latitute of 40 degrees.



#### The majority of volunteers submitted Monarch Adult and Milkweed observational reports.

## A surprising number of volunteers reported seeing their first monarchs of the season as well as fall roosts.



Monarch First: 217 volunteers observed their first monarchs during the Blitz, many commenting that these "first" sightings were unusually late compared to last year.

Monarch Fall Roosts: 2 volunteers reported seeing monarch roosts during the Blitz. Roosts were not reported during the 2022 Blitz.
