Data Literacy--Data Visualizations

In partnerhips with BSCS/FieldScope, we created a new learning modules to be used by educators to explore monarch roost data.

Teacher Workshops

We participated in two educator training workshops (the North American Monarch Institute and Advanced Schoolyard Ecology Exploration) to model inquiry-based teaching to light the interest of students in monarchs, dragonflies, phenology, water quality and many more subjects. These workshops have been developed in partnership with the US Forest Service International Programs, Monarch Joint Venture, and the University of Wisconsin-Madison Arboretum.
